The Organizational Leadership Program

The University of Louisiana System currently offers an interdisciplinary degree completion program — a completely online Bachelor of Arts in Organizational Leadership degree. The program is designed for working adults who have already earned at least 60 hours of college credit and want to finish a bachelor's degree. The degree will consist of 30 hours of courses offered jointly by faculty at the nine UL System universities and 30 hours of concentration and elective courses offered by each institution.

To enter the program, students must be at least 25 years old and have completed 60 hours of college credit, including general education courses. However, students with less than 60 hours will have opportunities to earn credit online.

Offered in five eight-week terms each year and charging a flat per credit hour rate of \$325, the program can be completed in two years, well below the cost of other online degree programs.

Disaster Management Career Forecast

According to U.S. News & World Report, emergency management specialists develop disaster response plans, train other people in an organization in disaster and emergency preparedness, and coordinate with various emergency personnel (such as those at state, local and municipal levels) to make sure emergency contingencies are covered. They also conduct disaster assessment and mitigation and direct recovery efforts.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics estimates the mean annual wage of those in this profession at \$62,850 and expects employment to grow by 2,800 or 22 percent between 2008 and 2018.
